

This year marks a year of completion for SACSCOC. In the ever-changing world of higher education and accreditation, our work visibly demonstrates SACSCOC's core values of peer review and continuity of quality.

As a collective, we should celebrate the accomplishments achieved this year. My predecessor initiated the review of our *Principles of Accreditation*. This effort involved colleagues from various institutions and administrative positions. The committee reviewed each standard and made revisions that clarified the expectations of the *Principles*, reduced redundancy, and better organized the topics. Many of you provided input, ensuring that the *Principles* provided an opportunity to strengthen institutional quality and enhance the academic experience for all our constituencies.

Yet, our work is not isolated to the Southern region. We are involved in national conversations regarding accreditation. We have participated with other regional accreditors, addressing many issues such as dual enrollment, graduation and completion rates, as well as the public's expectations of accreditors. Our *Principles* and our adherence to the peer review process keeps SACSCOC as an entity that is well respected at the federal level. To that end, the National Advisory Committee on Institutional Quality and Integrity (NACIQI), an advisory committee to the U.S. Department of Education, recommended recognition for an additional five years when SACSCOC was before it in June 2017.

While the Board of Trustees, the President and our institutional colleagues have achieved several significant goals, many challenges remain for accrediting agencies. These important conversations require our active participation. The best round-table for these discussions will occur during your service as peer reviewers. Such service ensures that SACSCOC attends to the public demand for integrity and quality as our institutions foster student success.

As we complete another segment of our work, we know that new opportunities await that will strengthen and enhance the academic success of students; improve the overall environment for our faculty scholars; and inspire the work of dedicated staff members at our institutions. Message from the President of SACSCOC



Another year, another opportunity to assist our members in their pursuit of excellence! And what a busy year it was. SACSCOC went through the renewal of the Recognition process with the U.S. Department of Education (DOE). That process is very similar to the reaffirmation process each of our member institutions experience every ten years; however, for accreditors it is an every five year process. In order for institutions to be able to avail themselves of federal financial aid, they must be accredited by a DOE recognized accreditor. We were successful in again being recognized for five years (we have been recognized since the mid-1950s) but I confess that with each of those experiences, I better understand the angst of having to explain to others the value accreditation provides.

Additionally, visits to Capitol Hill provided many more opportunities to explain what we mean by quality institutions, as well as to explain that low graduation rates do not always mean poor performing institutions. Sometimes, it has to do with the way we count students who attend, how they attend, how long it takes them to complete, and from where. There is no denying that we must focus on student SUCCESS! Our country is dependent upon us to provide not only educated citizens but a strong workforce so getting them into college is no longer enough. We must get them out prepared.

Of the approximately 66 members of the House and Senate Education Committees, 21 are from states within the Southern region and I was able to meet with all but four of them or their legislative assistants. Included among them are the Chairs of BOTH the House and Senate Committees and the Ranking member of the House Committee so, I feel obligated to make sure that the concerns of our member institutions are heard.

Meanwhile, back at home, we continue to replace retiring staff members, work on finalizing the implementation of our new data management system, hold training sessions for peer reviewers, and prepare for our two professional development meetings (Summer Institute and Annual Meeting). Additionally, the work of the Principles Review Committee was completed with the College Delegate Assembly adopting the revisions to the *Principles of Accreditation*. Many thanks to Dr. Sandra Jordan who chaired the Committee, along with all of the hard working members who worked diligently to make it happen.



Philosophical Statement

The membership of SACSCOC supports the right of an institution to pursue its established educational mission; the right of faculty to teach, investigate, and publish freely; and the right of students to access opportunities for learning and for the open exchange of ideas. 

From 2013 to 2017, SACSCOC received an average of 2,932 submissions annually from member institutions.



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

Reviewed staff reports on the following: (1) the 12th Small College Initiative session held April 18, 2017, that focused on effective governance; (2) an overview of strategic plan activities; (3) substantive change activities; (4) training and research summaries on findings from a number of surveys; and an update on SACSCOC's new Data Management System.
- Received and approved the changes to the Principles of Accreditation as proposed by the Principles Review Committee, chaired by Dr. Sandra Jordan, Chancellor of the University of South Carolina-Aiken. The proposal was forwarded to the Board for approval.
- Approved the list of revised standards that an applicant institution must meet in order to be awarded initial candidacy, pending approval of the revised standards in December 2017.
- 7. Approved the procedures to be used by applicant and candidate institutions when transitioning from the current to the revised standards. During its meeting in March, the Council had approved the procedures to be used by member institutions scheduled

- for reaffirmation in 2018 and 2019 when transitioning from the current to the revised standards.
- Approved the list of revised standards that will comprise the compliance certification for an updated Fifth-Year Interim Report, pending approval of the revised standards in December 2017.
- Approved revisions to five current SACSCOC's policies and forwarded them to the Board for final approval.
- 10.Evaluated the President of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges and renewed her contract for one year.

The Chair called on SACSCOC legal counsel, Mr. Patrick McKee, to update the Board on current litigation and other legal matters.

Following Mr. McKee's report, the Chair recognized Board member Suzanne Ozment who is retiring June 30, 2017, from her current position at the University of Montevallo in Alabama, and thanked her for her work as a Board member and for her involvement in the peer review process.

Report from the President

Dr. Belle S. Wheelan, President of SACSCOC, thanked Board members and staff for their support and assistance. She expressed appreciation to the Council and C & R readers for their diligence and time in preparing for and making decisions regarding policies and the accreditation of institutions. She presented SACSCOC's budget and thanked the Council for their continuing support of her leadership. She also updated the Board regarding SACSCOC's upcoming recognition renewal review by the U.S. Department of Education and reauthorization matters.

Actions on SACSCOC's Policies, Procedures, and Best Practices

The Board of Trustees took the following actions in regard to SACSCOC's policies, procedures, and best practices:

 Modified three SACSCOC's policies dealing with an institution's obligations for integrity in its relationship with SACSCOC, in its disclosure of information to the public, and in its advertisement and recruitment practices. Because several of the policies overlapped, they were streamlined to create distinctiveness, clarity, and focus.

"Integrity and Institutional Obligations to SACSCOC." The approved changes include renaming the policy and transferring to another policy the provision that the institution report accurately to the public its status and relationship with the Commission.

"Institutional Obligations for Public Disclosure." The approved changes add a section on an institution's representation of status with SACSCOC and clarification regarding an institution's accredited status.

"Student Advertising and Recruitment." The revisions include eliminating redundant statements that quote the current standards, and deleting passages regarding an institution's representation, which was moved to another policy.

- 2. Modification to current SACSCOC's policy, "Accreditation Procedures for Applicant Institutions." The modification to this policy eliminated the previous practice of allowing the date of the initial accreditation of an institution to be effective retroactively to January 1 of the year in which accreditation is awarded. The revision modifies current policy so that the date of initial membership is effective on the date of SACSCOC Board action to grant initial accreditation.
- Modification to current SACSCOC's policy, "Unsolicited Information." The modification

- to this policy eliminated the provision that an institution be required to report to SACSCOC any U.S. Department of Education investigation on sexual violence. In its place, the Council voted to add Comprehensive Standard 3.11.2 (Institutional environment) to the list of standards that comprise the Fifth-Year Interim Report and to make it clear on both the fifth-year and decennial compliance certifications that an institution is required to report the status of any USDOE investigation on sexual violence.
- 4. Approved proposed changes to SACSCOC's Principles of Accreditation: Foundations for Quality Enhancement. Dr. Sandra Jordan, Chair of the Principles Review Committee, provided an overview of the process and the changes to the proposed standards. In addition, Dr. Jordan indicated that the Committee had been charged to consider the possibility of a differentiated review at the time of an institution's reaffirmation and that, to date, the Committee made recommendations to the Council in three areas: (1) eligibility criteria for applying for a differentiated review, (2) standards to be used, and (3) a process for the selection and review of institutions applying to participate. The recommendation also states that the process would be open to any SACSCOC-accredited institution that applies and meets the eligibility criteria.

Dr. Jordan then moved adoption of the revised *Principles of Accreditation* on behalf of the Committee. Following her motion, there was discussion regarding two provisions of the proposal: 6.2.c (Program coordination) and 7.2 (Quality Enhancement Plan).

Proposed Standard 6.2.c (Program coordination) reads: "For each of its educational programs, the institution (a) justifies and documents the qualifications of its faculty members (Faculty qualifications), (b) employs a sufficient number of full-time faculty members to ensure curriculum and program quality, integrity, and review (Program faculty), and (c)

assigns appropriate responsibility for program coordination (Program coordination)." Board member Rebecca Adams moved to revise the statement 6.2.c because it did not specifically require academically qualified faculty to coordinate the program. The Board voted to divide the question. After discussion, the question was called and the motion to revise Standard 6.2.c was defeated.

Proposed Standard 7.2 reads: "The institution has a Quality Enhancement Plan that (a) has a topic identified through its ongoing, comprehensive planning and evaluation processes; (b) has broad-based support of institutional constituencies; (c) focuses on improving specific learning outcomes and/or student success; (d) commits resources to initiate, implement, and complete the QEP; and (e) includes a plan to assess achievement." Board member Timothy McNamara opened the discussion questioning the necessity for the QEP, especially since all current member institutions have implemented at least one QEP following the adoption of the standard in the 2004 Principles of Accreditation. The standard appeared to intrude in the operations of an institution and to limit the timing of an institution to start and complete goals related to its own strategic plan. Additional discussion ensued regarding the interpretation of the proposed standard. Then Board member Ruth Feiock proposed that the preface to Section 7 be revised to reguire only newly-accredited institutions to complete a Quality Enhancement Plan. The Board voted to divide the question. After discussion, the question was called and the motion to revise the preface to Section 7 was defeated. The Board accepted a recommendation from Board member James Netherton to approve the appointment of a study committee to develop the interpretation of Standard 7.2 to include the concerns expressed in the discussions.

Then the question was called to adopt the proposed changes to the *Principles of Accreditation* as presented. The Board voted

to approve the revisions and to forward the document to the membership for final approval during the Business Meeting of the College Delegate Assembly in December 2017.

Chair Moody asked Glenda Colagross, Chair of the Committee to Review Fifth-Year Interim Reports, to report on the review of 34 Track A institutions that make up the 2022 Track A reaffirmation class. Colagross reported that 25 of the 34 institutions reviewed were requested to submit a Referral Report to the SACSCOC Committees on Compliance and Reports. Standards most often cited were Comprehensive Standard 3.3.1.1 (Institutional effectiveness: educational programs), Comprehensive Standard 3.4.11 (Academic program coordination), and Federal Requirement 4.1 (Student achievement).

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 10:50 a.m.

Minutes of the Business Meeting of the College Delegate Assembly of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges—December 5, 2017

The College Delegate Assembly of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) held its Annual Business Meeting at the Omni Dallas Hotel, Dallas, Texas, on December 5, 2017, at 10:30 a.m. Dr. Nancy Moody, Chair of the SACSCOC Board of Trustees and, President, *Emerita*, Tusculum College, Greeneville, Tennessee, presided. Dr. Alfred Rankins, Jr., President of Alcorn State University, Lorman, Mississippi, served as Vice Chair.

Chair Moody introduced the meeting's speaker, Dr. Belle Wheelan, SACSCOC President, who presented the "State of the Commission."

Following Dr. Wheelan's presentation, Chair Moody recognized and commended the work of the *Principles* Review Committee, especially the leadership of Dr. Sandra Jordan, who served as the committee chair. Dr. Jordan provided an overview of the committee's work. Major re-organization of the SACSCOC *Principles* in a manner that created intentional and intuitive flow around broad topic areas, reduced redundancy and clarified the language were the key components of the changes to the *Principles*. Two new standards were added: governing board self-evaluation and student

debt. Further, the Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP) was retained but is no longer a Core Requirement.

Following Dr. Jordan's presentation, Chair Moody convened the business portion of the session and reported on the actions taken by the Executive Council and the SACSCOC Board of Trustees during their meetings December 1-3, 2017. (Refer to the December 3, 2017, meeting of the SACSCOC Board of Trustees for the minutes describing these actions.)


Leadership Transition



NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accompanying financial statements include the accounts of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, Inc. (the Commission), a Georgia nonprofit corporation, without capital stock, and a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, Inc. (SACS). The Commission was incorporated exclusively for educational purposes, and is the regional body for the accreditation of degree-granting higher education institutions in the southern United States. The Commission grants normal credit terms to its members.

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

A summary of the significant accounting policies of the Commission applied in the preparation of the accompanying financial statements follows.

Financial Statement Presentation

The Commission's financial statements are prepared in accordance with Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 958, Not-for-Profit Entities (ASC 958). Under ASC 958, the Commission is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets. The Commission considers all of its net assets to be unrestricted net assets. In addition, the Commission is required to present a statement of cash flows.

Allowance for Doubtful Accounts

The Commission provides an allowance for doubtful accounts equal to the estimated collection losses that will be incurred in the collection of all receivables. The estimated losses are based upon historical collection experience coupled with a review of the current status of existing receivables.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment is stated at cost. The Commission capitalizes property and equipment with a cost of \$1,500 or more and a useful life in excess of one year. Depreciation of property and equipment is provided in amounts sufficient to relate the cost of depreciable assets to operations over their estimated useful lives on a straight-line basis.

Website Development Costs

Website development costs relate to a system developed by the Commission to support the production of webinars. The system allows schools to access training and other webinars to help further support the relationship between the Commission and the schools it services. Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized as services are provided and on a pro-rata basis over the accreditation period. Revenue from publication sales is recognized upon shipment to the customer.

Deferred Revenue

Deferred revenue reported as a current liability represents membership dues and registration fees related to future periods, which were received prior to the end of the fiscal year.

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Concentrations of Credit Risk

Financial instruments, which potentially subject the Commission to concentrations of credit risk, are principally receivables and investments. Concentration of credit risk with respect to receivables is limited due to the members comprising the Commission's member base and the profession in which its members operate. To reduce risk, the Commission routinely assesses the financial strength of its members and, as a consequence, believes that its receivables credit risk exposure is limited. Concentration of credit risk with respect to investments is limited due to the diversified nature of the Commission's investment portfolio (Note 2). To further reduce credit risk, the Commission's Administrative Council and the Trust Department of the Commission's principal investment institution routinely assess the financial strength and diversification of the investments.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Commission considers all highly liquid debt instruments purchased with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Income Taxes

The Commission is exempt from federal income taxes under the provisions of §501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the Code). The Internal Revenue Service has also determined that the Commission is not a private foundation as defined by §509(a)(1) of the Code.

NOTE 2: INVESTMENTS

Investments at June 30, 2017, are recorded at fair value based on quoted market prices in accordance with FASB ASC 820, *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures* (ASC 820). The Commission's investments represent funds held for future operational or capital needs. Changes in the basis of investments held at the end of the year are reflected in the statement of activities as unrealized appreciation/depreciation in the market value of investments. Realized gains and losses on the sale of investments are recorded based upon the difference between the proceeds and the basis of the investments. The basis of the investments is determined by the specific-identification method. Interest income and dividends are recognized when earned.

ASC 820 defines fair value as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date (exit price).

ASC 820 classifies inputs used to measure fair value into the following hierarchy:

Level 1 - Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

NOTE 2: INVESTMENTS (CONTINUED)

Level 2 - Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for similar assets or liabilities, or unadjusted quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active, or inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Unobservable inputs for the asset or liability.

Assets measured at fair value on a recurring basis comprise investments totaling \$6,830,127 as of June 30, 2017.

Generally, for all investments, fair value is determined by reference to quoted market prices and other relevant information generated by market transactions. The investments are managed by Fifth Third Bank.

NOTE 3: LITIGATION SETTLEMENTS

In August 2007, the Commission was named as a defendant in a lawsuit filed by a member. The member was seeking restoration of accreditation, related costs and attorney's fees. In May 2010, a consent order was issued whereby the Commission agreed to continue the member's accreditation for an additional year ending in May 2011. Also in May 2010, a release of claims and settlement agreement was reached between the Commission and member, awarding the Commission the recovery of attorney fees in the amount of \$1,000,000. In accordance with the settlement, the member paid \$200,000 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011. The member also signed a note payable to the Commission for the remaining \$800,000, to be payable in annual installments of \$100,000, with the final installment and accrued interest, at a rate of 3%, to be paid on January 31, 2020. At June 30, 2017, the Commission has recognized the settlement award as a note receivable in the amount of \$200,000, net of an estimated allowance for doubtful accounts of approximately \$100,000.

NOTE 3: LITIGATION SETTLEMENTS (CONTINUED)

The Commission filed a lawsuit against a member during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011. The member was originally seeking restoration of accreditation, of which the court did not grant. The Commission filed suit seeking the recovery of attorney's fees related to previous suits. In October 2011, a release of claims and settlement agreement was reached between them. The member signed a note payable to the Commission for \$600,000, to be payable in ten annual installments of various amounts, with the final installment and accrued interest, at a rate of 3%, to be paid on June 30, 2020. At June 30, 2017, the Commission has recognized the settlement award as a note receivable in the amount of \$299,000, net of an estimated allowance for doubtful accounts of approximately \$149,500. During the year ended June 30, 2017, the member did not make the scheduled annual payment. The Commission believes the estimated allowance for doubtful accounts is adequate coverage for any potential uncollected balance.

In August 2009, the Commission was named as a defendant in a lawsuit filed by a member. The member was seeking restoration of accreditation. In December 2011, a release of claims and settlement agreement was reached where the Commission was awarded a recovery of attorney fees in the amount of \$550,000. In accordance with the settlement, the member is required to pay seven annual installments of various amounts including interest at a rate of 3%, with the final payment to be made June 30, 2018. At June 30, 2017, the Commission has recognized the settlement award as a note receivable in the amount of \$270,124, net of an estimated allowance for doubtful accounts of approximately \$75,000.

NOTE 4: PENSION AND POSTRETIREMENT PLANS

The Commission has a contributory Defined Contribution Pension Plan (the Plan) in which substantially all employees of the Commission are required to participate. Under the requirements of the Plan, the employees contribute 2.5% of their regular salary (as defined), and the Commission contributes 12.5% of the employee's regular salary (as defined) for the purchase of individual deferred mutual funds from Lincoln Financial. The Commission's pension expense for the year ended June 30, 2017, was approximately \$633,000.

The Commission, along with the Career and Technical Education Consortium of States, Inc. (CTECS) and Advance Education, Inc. (AdvancED), provides certain health care insurance benefits for retired employees and their dependents. The Plan has been closed to new participants. Certain employees become eligible for health care insurance benefits if they retire after they reach 60 years of age and achieve 10 years of continuous service while working for the Commission. The Commission accounts for these benefits under FASB ASC 715, *Compensation - Retirement Benefits* (ASC 715), which requires a company that sponsors a postretirement benefit plan to recognize in its statement of financial position, the funded status of a benefit plan.

NOTE 4: PENSION AND POSTRETIREMENT PLANS (CONTINUED)

Each entity is responsible for employee benefits for employees that retired from each respective entity. Based on the allocations of employees retired from each employer, approximately 56% of the benefit obligations have been allocated to the Commission, and the remaining portion has been allocated to CTECS and AdvancED. The Commission contributed approximately \$154,000 to pay benefits during the year ended June 30, 2017.

The disclosure below represents the total benefit obligation for the entire plan as well as the Commission's allocated portion.

The Commission, CTECS and AdvancED expect to contribute a combined \$305,000 to the postretirement benefit plan from July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2018.

If the health care cost trend rates were increased by 1% for all future years, the accumulated postretirement benefit obligation for the total plan as of June 30, 2017, would have increased by approximately \$443,000. The aggregate of the service and interest cost for the total plan for the year ended June 30, 2017, would have increased by approximately \$16,000. If the health care cost trend rates were decreased by 1% for all future years, the accumulated postretirement benefit obligation for the total plan as of June 30, 2017 would have decreased by approximately \$373,000. The aggregate of the service and interest cost for the total plan for the year ended June 30, 2017, would have decreased by approximately \$13,000.

NOTE 5: COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

The Commission leases certain vehicles and equipment under non-cancelable lease agreements expiring at various dates through June 2020. The leases are classified as operating leases in accordance with FASB ASC 840, *Leases*. Rent expense was approximately \$78,000 for the year ended June 30, 2017. The future minimum lease payments required under the non-cancelable operating leases are as follows:

NOTE 5: COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES (CONTINUED)

The Commission has cash deposits and investment accounts with financial institutions, which fluctuate from time to time in excess of the insured limitation of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. If these financial institutions were not to honor their contractual liability, the Commission could incur losses. Management is of the opinion that there is no risk of loss because of the financial strength of these financial institutions.

From time to time, the Commission may have asserted and unasserted claims arising in the normal course of business, most often these claims involve the Commission's denial of accreditation of a member institution. The Commission does not expect losses, if any, arising from these asserted and unasserted claims to have a material effect on the financial statements.

NOTE 6: DEFERRED COMPENSATION

The Commission has entered into deferred compensation agreements with certain current and former employees. These agreements require the Commission to pay a portion of each employee's salary into a salary continuation account that is invested into certain investments as defined by the agreements. These payments are required to continue through each employee's stated vested date. Upon retirement and participant request, the fair values of the salary continuation accounts are to be paid to the employees in sixty substantially equal monthly installments. At June 30, 2017, the investments – deferred compensation consist primarily of mutual funds and are presented at fair value based on Level 1 measurements.

NOTE 7: RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Commission has an agreement with an insurance carrier whereby the Commission's group health insurance are partially self-insured. Under the agreement, the Commission funds each employee and/or his/her dependent claims up to a maximum of \$50,000 annually. The maximum liability to the claim fund cannot exceed \$1,000,000 annually. At June 30, 2017, the Commission had no unfunded liability for submitted claims. Claims for occurrences prior to June 30, 2017, were unknown at that date and are estimated to be insignificant.

As discussed in Note 4, the Commission also maintains a plan that provides certain health care insurance benefits for retired employees and their dependents. The Commission has certain employees and former employees that participate in this plan. SACS accounts for these benefits under FASB ASC 715, which requires an entity that sponsors a postretirement benefit plan to recognize in its statement of financial position, the funded status of the benefit plan. Accordingly, the entire funded status at June 30, 2017, has been recorded by SACS.

The Commission's portion of the obligation in the amount of \$2,446,986 has been recognized as due to related party - post retirement benefit obligation in the accompanying statement of financial position.

NOTE 7: RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS (CONTINUED)

During the year ended June 30, 2017, the Commission charged CTECS \$50,000 for the use of business administration personnel and office space. At June 30, 2017, the Commission had a receivable of approximately \$4,000 due from CTECS for various operating expenses paid by the Commission on behalf of CTECS.

The Commission, with AdvancEd, jointly funds SACS retiree's portion of the health care insurance benefit through a contribution to SACS. While the Commission is not legally obligated to fund this benefit of SACS, management plans to continue funding 50% of the SACS retirees health care insurance benefits for the foreseeable future. The Commission's portion of SACS benefit amounted to approximately \$35,000 for the year ended June 30, 2017.

NOTE 8: SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent events have been evaluated through October 9, 2017, which is the date that the financial statements were available to be issued.
