Message from the Chair of SACSCOC Board of Trustees



Artificial Intelligence (AI) is here, and it is everywhere. Over the last several years, it has become more prominent and prevalent in our classrooms and across campus. Many novel approaches for AI or AI-generated content made this a very provocative topic in academic circles. Early on the use of this academic tool raised concerns regarding plagiarism by students and scholars. More recently, the use of AI to enhance productivity and data-collection has sparked the curiosity of scholars and administrators. The speed of AI's expanding use and possibilities raises points of interest to all institutional constituencies. The question before accreditors and peer evaluators is how to balance the need for ensuring quality and integrity of this academic tool to prevent the erosion of public trust in the use of this tool.

A new and innovative tool, Artificial Intelligence or Al-generated information has propelled the educational experience forward. Students that have grown-up with technology were bored with the "chalk and talk" methodology they found in the classroom. Now Al generated processes and information permits faculty to facilitate a "conversation" with innovators from the past into the classroom experience. The speed of creating a word cloud on each student's laptop as professors brainstorm ideas about a new concept engage students in a true exchange of ideas and information. The creativity that students bring into the classroom by using this tool, have students interacting in virtual classrooms, chat groups, and other virtual spaces outside of the classroom (and my computer just provided the last three words to this sentence).

Just as that simple step of giving me the phrase to complete my thought stunned me, the introduction of AI tools raises cautionary tales that accompany the good news. Just as the computer captured the writer's "voice" to know the next words, could someone create computer algorithms that inject bias into what is written or created? When did the computer begin collecting information about my "voice" and did I provide consent permitting it to do that? What are the risks for cognitive manipulation or misinformation? These questions raise real concerns regarding reliability and ethical obligations.

In the recent years, AI discussions have been on students and faculty; but, there is a role for others. Institutional administrators, peer evaluators, and accreditors have to stay abreast of this educational tool—its purpose, usage, validity, and consequences. For accreditors, our responsibilities insist that we focus on the quality and integrity of higher education. Therefore, here is another opportunity for us to learn the issues that surround AI generated efforts and to ensure that there are policies and procedures that permit effective use of these academic tools, while continuing the integrity of the learning process. When we ensure this balance, then we renew the public's trust in our roles and responsibilities as accreditors.

The Impact of Artificial Intelligence on Higher Education

I'm old enough to remember the television program 'The Jetson's' when it originally aired! Cars flying in the sky, robots doing housekeeping, teledoc visits were depicted as *futuristic* activities to which we could look forward. Well, the future is now. Maybe not for all of the events the show predicted but certainly for the ability to program computers to do the work so many of us have spent our lives doing.

Artificial intelligence (AI) is currently being used in the medical field to locate tumors before symptoms are obvious, control traffic signals in real, and locate information for students in a more concise manner. Tools like ChapGPT, Siri, facial recognition, Alexa, iTranslate, Bing and Google Search are computer applications that are already commonplace in today's world and have been designed to make our lives easier, or at least to be able to do things faster.

In higher education, administrators are using AI tools in the areas of recruitment, admission, retention, and other decision-making processes in order to improve productivity. Faculty are learning how to detect plagiarized works received from students. Students are using AI tools to write research papers and sift through large amounts of information quickly, thereby shortening the time to learning.

The ability to retrieve information, synthesize speech and answer questions has been made easier through AI but it is not without its challenges. For institutions of higher education, the challenges are not only academic but ethical and legal. While computers can sift through information, many inaccuracies can occur when individuals are inputting information. We have to ponder how much student learning really occurs when students depend upon a machine (computer) to do their research, upending the entire academic endeavor involved in understanding research methods, how to analyze information, and how to draft persuasive arguments crafted by the information resulting from the research process. We continue to struggle with the challenge of workforce reductions in staff needed to perform tasks but puts real people out of work. So, what needs to be done?


Faculty and administrators need to have candid conversations about the impact of AI on their work. Institutions need to develop policies in order to create a framework of ethical use by everyone involved. Yes, the future is now. Philosophical Statement

SACSCOC supports the right of an institution to pursue its own educational mission as inherent in fundamental values of institutional autonomy; the right of faculty members to teach, investigate, and publish freely; and the right of students to access opportunities for learning and for the open expression and exchange of ideas. 

Total Number of Submissions (2018–2023)







- 2. a final overview of SACSCOC's 2019–2023 Strategic Plan activities. The staff has begun work on the next five-year plan.
- an update from Data Management which noted the launch of the institutional portal that permits members to upload Compliance Certification documents and other reports. Staff were commended for their work on this effort.
- an update on the Substantive Change Office activities, which included updates to the recent changes to the Prison Education Program in the federal regulations; and
- 5. an update from the Office of Training and Research.
- The Council reviewed and recommend four (4) policy revisions for your consideration and information. (See discussion of policies below.)

Chair Maloney called on SACSCOC legal counsel, Mr. Patrick McKee, for a report to the Board. Mr. McKee informed the Board that there was no litigation underway at this time. He reported that the decision in the Bennett matter was against SACSCOC. The court ruled that Bennett did not have to pay the litigation cost as noted in policy based on his interpretation of "withdrawal". This decision represents the first loss in over 30 years of representation.

President's Report

Following Mr. McKee's report, Chair Maloney informed the board that the Executive Council extended the President's contract for another year. Further, she noted that the Evaluation Committee revised the President's evaluation process. The Chair recognized President Belle Wheelan for her report. Dr. Wheelan expressed her appreciation to all Board members for their dedication and

service and for their support. After she presented the proposed budget for FY 2023–2024, there was a motion and a second to approve the FY 2023–2024 budget to include a raise for the staff. It was approved.

Chair Maloney thanked Dr. Wheelan for her continued strong leadership.

Chair Maloney reported the following interim appointments to the board:

Chair Maloney asked Jacqueline Mok, Chair of the Committee to Review Fifth- Year Interim Reports, to report on the review of the 36 Track A institutions that make up the 2025 Class.

The Chair thanked the chairs, Board members, evaluators and Special Readers for their collective reviews and recommendations for their institutional peers. As a point of personal privilege, the chair thanked the board members for their support and work during her tenure as Board chair and passed the gavel to Chair-elect Blaine Hansen.

There being no further business, Chair-elect Hansen adjourned the meeting.

The College Delegate Assembly of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) held its Annual Business Meeting at the Orlando World Center Marriott in Orlando, Florida. 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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Board of Trustees of Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, Inc.

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, Inc. (a non-profit organization referred to as the Commission), which comprise the statement of financial position as of June 30, 2023, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Note 1: DESCRIPTION OF THE ORGANIZATION

The accompanying financial statements include the accounts of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, Inc. (the Commission), a Georgia nonprofit corporation, without capital stock, and a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, Inc. (SACS). The Commission was incorporated exclusively for educational purposes, and is the regional body for the accreditation of degree-granting higher education institutions in the southern United States. The Commission grants normal credit terms to its members.

Note 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP). The Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) provides authoritative guidance regarding U.S. GAAP through the Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) and related Accounting Standards Updates (ASUs).

Use of Estimates

The preparation of U.S. GAAP financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Estimates that are particularly susceptible to significant change in the near term are related to the allowance for doubtful accounts, the estimate of the post retirement benefit obligation and the fair value of investments and financial instruments.

Program Services

The Commission's program services consist of the following:

Member services – The Commission provides access to industry information, consultation and cost saving programs.

Registration and application – The Commission provides annual meetings and summer institutes designed for enhancing participants understanding of the Commison principles, preparing for quality assessments and learning effective strategies for improving assessments.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash and all highly liquid investments with an original maturity of 90 days or less.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are stated at unpaid balances, less an allowance for doubtful accounts. The Commission provides for losses on accounts receivable using the allowance method. The allowance is based on experience, third-party contracts, and other circumstances, which may affect the ability of members to meet their obligations.

Note 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Accounts Receivable (continued)

Receivables are considered impaired if full principal payments are not received in accordance with the contractual terms. It is the Commission's policy to charge off uncollectible accounts receivable when management determines the receivable will not be collected.

Investments

The Commission reports investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities at their fair values in the Statement of Financial Position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets in the accompanying Statement of Activities. Investment income and gains restricted by donors are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions if the restrictions are met (either a stipulated time period ends, or a purpose restriction is accomplished) in the reporting period in which the income and gains are recognized.

Property and Equipment

All acquisitions of property and equipment in excess of \$1,500 and all expenditures for maintenance, renewals, and betterments that materially prolong the useful lives of assets are capitalized. Repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred. Property and equipment are carried at cost or, if donated, at the approximate fair value at the date of donation. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets.

Net Assets

The Commission reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets that are based upon the existence or absence of restrictions on use that are placed by its donors: net assets without donor restrictions and net assets with donor restrictions.

Net assets without donor restrictions are resources available to support operations and not subject to donor restrictions. The only limits on the use of net assets without donor restrictions are the broad limits resulting from the nature of the Commission, the environment in which it operates, the purposes specified in its corporate documents and its application for tax-exempt status, and any limits resulting from contractual agreements with creditors and others that are entered into in the course of its operations.

Net assets with donor restrictions are resources that are subject to donor-imposed restrictions. Some restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that are restricted by a donor for use for a particular purpose or in a particular future period. Other restrictions may be perpetual in nature; such as those that are restricted by a donor that the resources be maintained in perpetuity.

When a donor's restriction is satisfied, either by using the resources in the manner specified by the donor or by the passage of time, the expiration of the restriction is reported in the financial statements by reclassifying the net assets from net assets with donor restrictions to net assets without donor restrictions. Contributions with donor restrictions that are both received and released within the same year are recorded as an increase in net assets with donor restrictions and as a satisfaction of program restrictions.

There were no net assets with donor restrictions as of June 30, 2023.

Note 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Revenue Recognition

Revenue from dues and fees and payments under various contracts is recognized as revenue when performance obligations under the terms of the contracts with customers are satisfied. Revenue received in advance is deferred and recognized over the periods to which the dates and fees relate. These amounts are included in performance obligation liabilities within the statement of financial position.

Grants are analyzed for measureable performance-related barriers or other barriers. Revenue is recognized as barriers are met.

Donated Assets

Donated investments and other noncash donations are recorded as contributions at their fair values at the date of donation.

Donated Services

Donated services are recognized as contributions if the services (a) create or enhance nonfinancial assets or (b) require specialized skills, are performed by people with those skills, and would otherwise be purchased by the Commission. Volunteers also provided fund-raising services throughout the year that are not recognized as contributions in the financial statements since the recognition criteria were not met.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

Directly identifiable expenses are charged to programs and supporting services. Expenses related to compensation, benefits and taxes, professional fees and contractors are allocated based on actual percentages of time spent in each functional area. Expenses related to the office, administrative costs, and maintenance are allocated across functional areas based on a fixed percentage.

Income Taxes

Under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, the Commission is exempt from taxes on income other than unrelated business income.

The Commission utilizes the accounting requirements associated with uncertainty in income taxes using the provisions of Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) ASC 740, *Income Taxes*. Using that guidance, tax positions initially need to be recognized in the financial statements when it is more-likely-than-not the positions will be sustained upon examination by the tax authorities. It also provides guidance for derecognition, classification, interest and penalties, accounting in interim periods, disclosure and transition. As of June 30, 2023, the Commission has no uncertain tax positions that qualify for recognition or disclosure in the financial statements.

Subsequent Events

Management has evaluated subsequent events through the date that the financial statements were available to be issued, November 7, 2023, and determined there were no events that occurred that required disclosure. No subsequent events occurring after this date have been evaluated for inclusion in the financial statements.

Note 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Recent Accounting Pronouncements

In February 2016, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued guidance (Accounting Standards Codification [ASC] 842, Leases) to increase transparency and comparability among organizations by requiring the recognition of right-of-use (ROU) assets and lease liabilities on the balance sheet. Most prominent among the changes in the standard is the recognition of ROU assets and lease liabilities by lessees for those leases classified as operating leases. Under the standard, disclosures are required to meet the objective of enabling users of financial statements to assess the amount, timing, and uncertainty of cash flows arising from leases. The Commission adopted the standard effective July 1, 2022. The standard did not have an impact on the Commission's financial statements.

Note 3: FINANCIAL ASSET AVAILABILITY

The Commission maintains its financial assets primarily in cash and cash equivalents and investments to provide liquidity to ensure funds are available as the Commission's expenditures come due. At June 30, 2023, the Commission had approximately \$16,194,000 available for use. Financial assets at year-end exclude property and equipment, website development costs, deferred compensation investments and prepaid expenses. The Commission is principally supported by its program service fees. The goal of the Commission is to maintain available financial assets to meet its next 60 days of operating expenses.

Note 7: WEBSITE DEVELOPMENT COSTS AND SOFTWARE

Website development costs relate to a system developed by the Commission to support the production of webinars. The system allows schools to access training and other webinars to help further support the relationship between the Commission and the schools it services. During the year ended June 30, 2018, the Commission began developing database software. The costs incurred during application development for both website development and database software have been capitalized in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

Note 8: REVENUE

The Commission recognizes revenue over time for its dues and certain fees. As of June 30, 2023, there are performance obligations to be satisfied of \$6,109,108. At June 30, 2023, management expects to recognize \$6,109,108 as revenue in 2024. The Commission's method of recognizing revenue is the input method for performance obligations to be utilized over time.

Note 8: REVENUE (Continued)

Revenue from registration, application and special fees, exhibitors, sponsors and publications are recorded at a point in time or over a period of time depending on the nature of the event or activity.

Note 9: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Fair value is the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. There are three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair values:

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the entity has the ability to access as of the measurement date.

Level 2: Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs, other than quoted prices, that are:
 - observable; or
 - can be corroborated by observable market data.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at June 30, 2023.

Common Stocks, Bonds and Bond Mutual Funds: Valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded.

Note 9: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS (Continued)

Mutual Funds and Real Estate Investment Trusts: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds and public real estate investment trusts held by the Commission are open-end funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds and public real estate investment trust funds held by the Commission are deemed to be actively traded.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Commission believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine fair value of certain financial instruments could result in different fair value measurements at the reporting date.

Changes in Fair Value Levels

The availability of observable market data is monitored to assess the appropriate classification of financial instruments within the fair value hierarchy. Changes in economic conditions or model-based valuation techniques may require the transfer of financial instruments from one fair value level to another. In such instances, the transfer is reported at the beginning of the reporting period.

Management evaluated the significance of transfer between levels based upon the nature of the financial instrument and size of the transfer relative to total assets. For the year ended June 30, 2023, there were no significant transfers in or out of Levels 1, 2 or 3.

Note 10: CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

The Commission maintains cash with a financial institution in excess of the FDIC limit of \$250,000 by approximately \$5,845,000 at June 30, 2023.

Note 11: COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

From time to time, the Commission may have asserted and unasserted claims arising in the normal course of business, most often these claims involve the Commission's denial of accreditation of a member institution. The Commission does not expect losses, if any, arising from these asserted and unasserted claims to have a material effect on the financial statements.

Note 12: PENSION AND POSTRETIREMENT PLANS

The Commission sponsors a defined contribution pension plan (the Plan) covering all employees. The Commission makes a contribution to the Plan each year equal to 12.5% of all participants' compensation. Total expense for the year ended June 30, 2023, was approximately \$742,000.

The Commission, along with the Career and Technical Education Consortium of States, Inc. (CTECS), provides certain health care insurance benefits for retired employees and their dependents. The Plan has been closed to new participants. Certain employees become eligible for health care insurance benefits if they retire after they reach 60 years of age and achieve 10 years of continuous service while working for the Commission. The Commission accounts for these benefits under FASB ASC 715, Compensation - Retirement Benefits (ASC 715), which requires a company that sponsors a postretirement benefit plan to recognize in its statement of financial position, the funded status of a benefit plan.

Each entity is responsible for employee benefits for employees that retired from each respective entity. Based on the allocations of employees retired from each employer, a portion of the benefit obligations have been allocated to the Commission. The Commission contributed approximately \$52,000 to pay benefits during the year ended June 30, 2023.

Note 13: DEFERRED COMPENSATION

The Commission has entered into deferred compensation agreements with certain current and former employees. These agreements require the Commission to pay a portion of each employee's salary into a salary continuation account that is invested into certain investments as defined by the agreements. These payments are required to continue through each employee's stated vested date. Upon retirement and participant request, the fair values of the salary continuation accounts are to be paid to the employees in sixty substantially equal monthly installments. At June 30, 2023, the investments – deferred compensation consist primarily of common stocks and are presented at fair value based on Level 1 measurements.

Note 14: RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Commission has an agreement with an insurance carrier whereby the Commission's group health insurance are partially self-insured. Under the agreement, the Commission funds each employee and/or his/her dependent claims up to a maximum of \$50,000 annually. The maximum liability to the claim fund cannot exceed \$1,000,000 annually.

At June 30, 2023, the Commission had no unfunded liability for submitted claims. Claims for occurrences prior to June 30, 2023, were unknown at that date and are estimated to be insignificant.

As discussed in Note 12, the Commission also maintains a plan that provides certain health care insurance benefits for retired employees and their dependents. The Commission has certain employees and former employees that participate in this plan. The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools accounts for these benefits under FASB ASC 715, which requires an entity that sponsors a postretirement benefit plan to recognize in its statement of financial position, the funded status of the benefit plan. Accordingly, the entire funded status at June 30, 2023, has been recorded by SACS.

Note 14: RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS (Continued)

The Commission's portion of the obligation in the amount of \$940,519 has been recognized as due to related party - postretirement benefit obligation in the accompanying statement of financial position.

During the year ended June 30, 2023, the Commission charged CTECS \$52,500 for the use of business administration personnel and office space. At June 30, 2023, the Commission had a receivable of \$16,883 due from CTECS for various operating expenses paid by the Commission on behalf of CTECS.
