Roueche National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development's International Leadership Award (2010) and the AACC Leadership Award (2011); the John Hope Franklin Award from Diverse Issues in Higher Education for outstanding leadership in higher education; and the Educational Testing Service (ETS) Terry O'Banion Prize in Education from the League for Innovation in Community Colleges.

## Annual Report

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### **Philosophical Statement**

SACSCOC supports the right of an institution to pursue its own educational mission as inherent in fundamental values of institutional autonomy; the right of faculty members to teach, investigate, and publish freely; and the right of students to access opportunities for learning and for the open expression and exchange of ideas. However, exercising these rights should not substantially interfere with the overriding obligation of an institution to offer a sound educational experience that optimizes student achievement outcomes.

During 2024, SACSCOC welcomed two members of the administrative staff: Dr. Rae Borden, Director of Legal and Governmental Affairs and Commission Support, and Dr. John R. Donnelly, Vice President.

#### Dr. Rae Borden



Dr. Rae Borden serves as the Director of Legal and Governmental Affairs, and Commission Support (OLGA) for the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges. Having started her now 25-year career as an Administrative Assistant with SACSCOC, this role marks Dr. Borden's return to higher education accreditation. Prior to rejoining the organization, Dr. Borden served in a variety of administrative roles, including as the Chief of Staff for Arizona State University's Knowledge Enterprise, as Associate Vice President and Deputy Chief of Staff for Xavier University of Louisiana, and as Administrative

Dr. Borden holds a B.A. in Communications from Southeastern Louisiana University, an MBA in Human Resources Management from Keller Graduate School of Management, and an Ed.D. in Organizational Leadership from Nova Southeastern University.

#### John R. Donnelly



John R. Donnelly currently serves as Vice President at the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) in Decatur, Georgia. He was appointed Vice President in December 2024. In that role he has administrative and management responsibilities for the quality and integrity of SACSCOC policies, processes, and procedures for an assigned portfolio of colleges and universities.

Prior to his current appointment he served as Vice President for Instruction and Student Affairs at Piedmont Virginia Community College in Charlottesville,

Virginia from 2010 to 2024. In that role he was the college's Chief Academic and Student Affairs Officer, providing leadership and administrative oversight of academic and student development programs and services. John also served as Provost/Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs at Massachusetts Bay Community College in Wellesley Hills, Massachusetts, and Dean of Instruction at the Locust Grove Campus of Germanna Community College in Fredericksburg, Virginia.





### **President's Report**

The Board denied reaffirmation, continued in accreditation, and placed the following institution on Warning:

 University of Lynchburg, Lynchburg, VA–For twelve months failure to comply with Core Requirement 13.2 (Financial documents), Standard 7.3 (Administrative effectiveness), Standard 8.2.a (Student outcomes: educational programs), Standard 8.2.c (Student outcomes: academic and student services) and Standard 13.3 (Financial responsibility) of the *Principles* of Accreditation. A Special Committee was not authorized to visit the institution.

## The Board denied reaffirmation, continued in accreditation and placed the following institutions on Probation for Good Cause:

• Georgetown College, Georgetown, KY—For twelve months for failure to comply with Core Requirement 4.1 (Governing board characteristics), Core Requirement 13.1 (Financial resources), and Standard 13.3 (Financial responsibility) of the *Principles of Accreditation*. A Special Committee was authorized to visit the institution.

# The Board denied authorization of a Candidacy Committee for the following institution:

- Northeastern Technical College, Cheraw, SC—For twelve months for failure to comply with Core Requirement 6.1 (Full-time faculty), Core Requirement 8.1 (Student achievement), Standard 5.4 (Qualified administrative/academic officers), Standard 6.2.b (Program faculty), and Standard 8.2.a (Student outcomes: educational programs) of the *Principles of Accreditation*. A Special Committee was not authorized to visit the institution.

A Special Committee was not authorized to visit the institution.

- Christian Brothers University, Memphis, TN– For twelve months for failure to comply with Standard 13.3 (Financial responsibility) of the *Principles of Accreditation*. A Special Committee was authorized to visit the institution.
- Guilford College, Greensboro, NC—For twelve months for failure to comply with Core Requirement 13.1 (Financial resources) and

Standard 13.3 (Financial responsibility) of the *Principles of Accreditation*. A Special Committee was authorized to visit the institution.

 Virginia Union University, Richmond, VA—For twelve months for failure to comply with Core Requirement 13.1 (Financial Resources), Standard 13.3 (Financial responsibility), Standard 13.4 (Control of finances), and Standard 13.6 (Federal and state responsibilities) of the *Principles of Accreditation*. A Special Committee was authorized to visit the institution.

## The Board removed the following institution from membership:

In accordance with the "Standing Rules: Board of Trustees, Executive Council, and the College Delegate Assembly," members of the Board abstained from a vote on the accreditation status of their respective institutions, affiliated institutions, and any other identified or recognized conflicts of interest.

The Chair thanked the chairs, Board members, evaluators and Special Readers for their collective reviews and recommendations for their institutional peers, and reminded all that the deliberations, decisions, and names of readers of the cases are confidential.

There being no further business, Chair Hansen adjourned the meeting.

## Minutes of the Business Meeting of the College Delegate Assembly of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges–December 10, 2024

The College Delegate Assembly of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) held its Annual Business Meeting at the Austin Convention Center, Austin, Texas. Chair Blaine J. Hansen, Executive Vice President for Strategic Operations & Public Relations, Lees-McRae College, Banner Elk, NC, called the meeting to order. Dr. Kemba K. Chambers Vice Chair, President, H. Councill Trenholm State Community College, Montgomery, AL, served as Vice Chair.

Chair Hansen introduced the meeting's speaker, Dr. Belle S. Wheelan, SACSCOC President, who presented the "State of the Commission."

Following Dr. Wheelan's presentation, Chair Hansen convened the business portion of the session and reported on the actions taken by the Executive Council and the SACSCOC Board of Trustees during their respective meetings held December 6-8, 2024. (Refer to the December 8, 2024, meeting of the SACSCOC Board of Trustees for the minutes describing these actions.) Hearing no objections to the agenda for the College Delegate Assembly meeting, the agenda was adopted as posted.

Chair Hansen referred the membership to the list of SACSCOC Board of Trustees elected on Sunday, December 8, 2024, to serve on the 2025 Executive Council, noting that the Board of Trustees approved a one-year term extension for several of the Executive Council members to remain on the Board to facilitate the presidential search and transition. The report was presented to the College Delegate Assembly as information. He recognized and thanked the following members of the 2024 SACSCOC Nominating Committee: Thomas "Tim" Hynes, President *Emeritus*, Clayton State University, Morrow, GA (Chair); Brenda Kays, President, Kilgore College, Kilgore, TX, Natalie Harder, President, Coker University, Hartsville, SC, Tim McNamara, Dean of Arts and Sciences and Professor of Psychology, Vanderbilt University, Nashville, TN, and Michael Woods, President, Woods Operating Company, Shreveport, LA.

## Report of SACSCOC on the Accreditation of Institutions

Vice Chair Chambers read the reports from the SACSCOC Board of Trustees regarding accreditation actions taken on June 13, 2024, and December 8, 2024. The reports were provided as information. (Refer to the June 13, 2024, and December 8, 2024, respective Minutes of the SACSCOC Board of Trustees.)

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned after announcing that the College Delegate Assembly would reconvene in Nashville, Tennessee, December 6-9, 2025, at the Music City Center and Omni Nashville. The meeting adjourned sine die.

## Appeals Proceedings of SACSCOC College Delegate Assembly

On December 3, 2023, the Board of Trustees of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) took action to remove Saint Augustine's University, Raleigh, North Carolina, from membership, citing failure to comply with Core Requirement 4.1 (Governing board characteristics), Core Requirement 13.1 (Financial resources), Core Requirement 13.2 (Financial documents), Standard 13.3 (Financial responsibility), Standard 13.4 (Control of finances), and Standard 13.6 (Federal and state responsibilities) of the *Principles of Accreditation*. On January 19, 2024, the institution appealed the decision of the Board.

The SACSCOC Appeals Committee and representatives of Saint Augustine's University convened on February 20, 2024, at a hearing in response to the institution's appeal of the Board's decision. On February 27, 2024, both parties were notified that the Appeals Committee had affirmed the decision of the SACSCOC Board of Trustees to remove the institution from membership finding (1) the Board's decision to be reasonable, not arbitrary, and based on the standards cited; and (2) that the institution failed to produce evidence that it had new, verifiable financial information material to the adverse action which was not available at the time of the Board's December review. Further, the Appeals Committee found that the institution failed to meet the provisions of Good Cause.

### Arbitration

Pursuant to 34 CFR Section 602.20(e) and 20 U.S.C. 1099b(e), SACSCOC member institutions

agree to submit any dispute involving the final denial, withdrawal, or termination of its accreditation to initial arbitration prior to any other legal action. On March 8, 2024, Saint Augustine's University notified the SACSCOC President of the institution's intent to pursue arbitration of the Appeals Committee's decision. On June 28, 2024, representatives of SACSCOC and Saint Augustine's University convened with the arbitrators in response to the institution's request. On July 21, 2024, SACSCOC and Saint Augustine's University were notified of the unanimous decision of the arbitrators to reverse the decision of the SACSCOC Appeals Committee of the College Delegate Assembly, finding that the institution should have been permitted to present new and verifiable financial information during the Appeals Hearing as it related to Core Requirement 4.1 (Governing board characteristics), Core Requirement 13.1 (Financial resources), Core Requirement 13.2 (Financial documents), Standard 13.3 (Financial responsibilities), Standard 13.4 (Control of finances), and Standard 13.6 (Federal and state responsibilities).

Subsequent to the decision of the arbitrators, Saint Augustine's University remained an accredited institution on Probation for Good Cause, and a review of its ongoing compliance with the cited standards was remanded to the Committees on Compliance and Reports (C&R) for review in December 2024.:

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### **Financial Statements**

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#### **INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT**

To the Board of Trustees of Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, Inc.

#### Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, Inc. (a non-profit organization referred to as the Commission), which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2024 and 2023, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Commission as of June 30, 2024 and 2023, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

#### **Basis for Opinion**

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Commission and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

#### **Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements**

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Commission's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

#### Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

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### Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, Inc. Notes to Financial Statements

#### Note 1: DESCRIPTION OF THE ORGANIZATION

The accompanying financial statements include the accounts of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, Inc. (the Commission), a Georgia nonprofit corporation, without capital stock, and a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, Inc. (SACS). The Commission was incorporated exclusively for educational purposes, and is the regional body for the accreditation of degree-granting higher education institutions in the southern United States. The Commission grants normal credit terms to its members.

The Commission's program services consist of the following:

*Member services* – The Commission provides access to industry information, consultation and cost saving programs.

*Registration and application* – The Commission provides annual meetings and summer institutes designed for enhancing participants understanding of the Commission principles, preparing for quality assessments and learning effective strategies for improving assessments.

#### **Note 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

#### **Basis of Accounting**

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP). The Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) provides authoritative guidance regarding U.S. GAAP through the Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) and related Accounting Standards Updates (ASUs).

#### Use of Estimates

The preparation of U.S. GAAP financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Estimates that are particularly susceptible to significant change in the near term are related to the allowance for credit losses, the estimate of the post-retirement benefit obligation and the fair value of investments and financial instruments.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash and all highly liquid investments with an original maturity of 90 days or less.

#### Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable represent amounts owed to the Commission which are expected to be collected within twelve months and are presented in the statements of financial position net of the allowance for credit losses.

#### Note 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

#### Allowance for Credit Losses

Management evaluates its receivables on an ongoing basis by analyzing customer relationships and previous payment histories. The allowance for credit losses is management's best estimate of the amount of expected credit losses in the existing accounts based on current market conditions. Historically, losses on uncollectible accounts have been within management's expectations. The allowance for credit losses is reviewed on a periodic basis to ensure there is sufficient reserve to cover any potential credit losses. When receivables are considered uncollectible, they are charged against the allowance for credit losses. Collections on accounts previously written off are included in the change in net assets as received. There was no allowance for credit losses at June 30, 2024 and 2023.

#### Investments

The Commission reports investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities at their fair values in the statements of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets in the accompanying Statements of Activities. Investment income and gains restricted by donors are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions if the restrictions are met (either a stipulated time period ends, or a purpose restriction is accomplished) in the reporting period in which the income and gains are recognized.

#### **Property and Equipment**

All acquisitions of property and equipment in excess of \$1,500 and all expenditures for maintenance, renewals, and betterments that materially prolong the useful lives of assets are capitalized. Repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred. Property and equipment are carried at cost or, if donated, at the approximate fair value at the date of donation. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets.

#### Leases

The Commission leases a vehicle. The Commission determines if an arrangement is a lease at inception. Operating leases are included in operating lease right-of-use (ROU) assets, other current liabilities, and operating lease liabilities the statements of financial position.

ROU assets represent the right to use an underlying asset for the lease term and lease liabilities represent the obligation to make lease payments arising from the lease. Operating lease ROU assets and liabilities are recognized at commencement date based on the present value of lease payments over the lease term. As most of the leases do not provide an implicit rate, the Commission uses a risk-free rate based on the information available at commencement date in determining the present value of lease payments. The operating lease ROU asset also includes any lease payments made and excludes lease incentives. The lease terms may include options to extend or terminate the lease when it is reasonably certain that the Organization will exercise that option. Lease expense for lease payments is recognized on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

The lease agreements do not contain any material residual value guarantees or material restrictive covenants.

### Note 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

#### Postretirement Benefit Plan

The Commission sponsors a postretirement benefit plan (the "Plan") for certain employees. The Commission accounts for these benefits under FASB ASC 715, *Compensation - Retirement Benefits* (ASC 715), which requires a company that sponsors a postretirement benefit plan to recognize in its statements of financial position, the funded status of a benefit plan. See Note 13.

#### Net Assets

The Commission reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets that are based upon the existence or absence of restrictions on use that are placed by its donors: net assets without donor restrictions and net assets with donor restrictions.

Net assets without donor restrictions are resources available to support operations and not subject to donor restrictions. The only limits on the use of net assets without donor restrictions are the broad limits resulting from the nature of the Commission, the environment in which it operates, the purposes specified in its corporate documents and its application for tax-exempt status, and any limits resulting from contractual agreements with creditors and others that are entered into in the course of its operations.

Net assets with donor restrictions are resources that are subject to donor-imposed restrictions. Some restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that are restricted by a donor for use for a particular purpose or in a particular future period. Other restrictions may be perpetual in nature; such as those that are restricted by a donor that the resources be maintained in perpetuity.

When a donor's restriction is satisfied, either by using the resources in the manner specified by the donor or by the passage of time, the expiration of the restriction is reported in the financial statements by reclassifying the net assets from net assets with donor restrictions to net assets without donor restrictions.

There were no net assets with donor restrictions as of June 30, 2024 and 2023.

#### **Revenue Recognition**

Revenue from dues and fees and payments under various contracts is recognized as revenue when performance obligations under the terms of the contracts with customers are satisfied. Revenue received in advance is deferred and recognized over the periods to which the dates and fees relate. These amounts are included in performance obligation liabilities within the statements of financial position.

Grants are analyzed for measurable performance-related barriers or other barriers. Revenue is recognized as barriers are met.

#### **Donated Assets**

Donated investments and other noncash donations are recorded as contributions at their fair values at the date of donation.

### Note 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

#### **Donated Services**

Donated services are recognized as contributions if the services (a) create or enhance nonfinancial assets or (b) require specialized skills, are performed by people with those skills, and would otherwise be purchased by the Commission. Volunteers also provided fund-raising services throughout the year that are not recognized as contributions in the financial statements since the recognition criteria were not met.

### Functional Allocation of Expenses

Directly identifiable expenses are charged to programs and supporting services. Expenses related to compensation, benefits and taxes, professional fees and contractors are allocated based on actual percentages of time spent in each functional area. Expenses related to the office, administrative costs, and maintenance are allocated across functional areas based on a fixed percentage.

#### Income Taxes

Under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, the Commission is exempt from taxes on income other than unrelated business income.

The Commission utilizes the accounting requirements associated with uncertainty in income taxes using the provisions of FASB ASC 740, *Income Taxes*. Using that guidance, tax positions initially need to be recognized in the financial statements when it is more-likely-than-not the positions will be sustained upon examination by the tax authorities. It also provides guidance for derecognition, classification, interest and penalties, accounting in interim periods, disclosure and transition. As of June 30, 2024 and 2023, the Commission has no uncertain tax positions that qualify for recognition or disclosure in the financial statements.

#### Subsequent Events

Management has evaluated subsequent events through the date that the financial statements were available to be issued, December 3, 2024, and determined there were no events that occurred that required disclosure. No subsequent events occurring after this date have been evaluated for inclusion in the financial statements.

#### **Recent Accounting Pronouncements**

In June 2016, the FASB issued ASU 2016-13, *Financial Instruments-Credit Losses (Topic 326): Measurement of Credit Losses on Financial Instruments*, which is often referred to as the CECL model, or current expected credit losses. Among other things, the amendments in this ASU require the measurement of all expected credit losses for financial assets held at the reporting date based on historical experience, current conditions, and reasonable and supportable forecasts. Financial institutions and other organizations will now use forward-looking information to better inform their credit loss estimates. Many of the loss estimation techniques applied today will still be permitted, although the inputs to those techniques will change to reflect the full amount of expected credit losses. In addition, the ASU amends the accounting for credit losses on available-for-sale debt securities and purchased financial assets with credit deterioration.

The Organization adopted ASU 2016-13 on July 1, 2023. The impact of the adoption was not considered material to the financial statements and primarily resulted in enhanced disclosures only.

### **Note 3: FINANCIAL ASSET AVAILABILITY**

The Commission maintains its financial assets primarily in cash and cash equivalents and investments to provide liquidity to ensure funds are available as the Commission's expenditures come due.

### Note 10: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Fair value is the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. There are three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair values:

*Level 1:* Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the entity has the ability to access as of the measurement date.

Level 2: Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs, other than quoted prices, that are:
  - observable; or
  - can be corroborated by observable market data.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at June 30, 2024.

*Common Stocks, Bonds and Bond Mutual Funds*: Valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded.

### Note 10: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS (Continued)

Mutual Funds and Real Estate Investment Trusts: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds and public real estate investment trusts held by the Commission are open-end funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds and public real estate investment trust funds held by the Commission are deemed to be actively traded.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Commission believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine fair value of certain financial instruments could result in different fair value measurements at the reporting date.

The availability of observable market data is monitored to assess the appropriate classification of financial instruments within the fair value hierarchy. Changes in economic conditions or modelbased valuation techniques may require the transfer of financial instruments from one fair value level to another. In such instances, the transfer is reported at the beginning of the reporting period.

Management evaluated the significance of transfer between levels based upon the nature of the financial instrument and size of the transfer relative to total assets. For the year ended June 30, 2024 and 2023, there were no significant transfers in or out of Levels 1, 2 or 3.

#### Note 11: CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

The Commission maintains cash with a financial institution in excess of the FDIC limit of \$250,000 by approximately \$5,783,000 and \$5,845,000 at June 30, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

#### Note 12: COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

From time to time, the Commission may have asserted and unasserted claims arising in the normal course of business, most often these claims involve the Commission's denial of accreditation of a member institution. The Commission does not expect losses, if any, arising from these asserted and unasserted claims to have a material effect on the financial statements.

#### **Note 13: RETIREMENT PLANS**

#### 403(b) Plan

The Commission sponsors a defined contribution 403(b) plan covering all employees. The Commission makes a contribution to the Plan each year equal to 12.5% of all participants' compensation. Total expense for the years ended June 30, 2024 and 2023, was approximately \$779,000 and \$742,000, respectively.

#### Postretirement Benefit Plan

The Commission, along with the Career and Technical Education Consortium of States, Inc. (CTECS), provides certain health care insurance benefits for retired employees and their dependents. This plan has been closed to new participants. Certain employees become eligible for health care insurance benefits if they retire after they reach 60 years of age and achieve 10 years of continuous service while working for the Commission. Each entity is responsible for employees benefits for employees that retired from each respective entity. Based on the allocations of employees retired from each employer, a portion of the benefit obligations have been allocated to the Commission. The Commission contributed approximately \$52,000 to pay benefits during the year ended June 30, 2024.

The disclosures below represent the postretirement benefit obligation for the Commission's allocated portion.

#### Note 14: DEFERRED COMPENSATION

The Commission has entered into deferred compensation agreements with certain current and former employees. These agreements require the Commission to pay a portion of each employee's salary into a salary continuation account that is invested into certain investments as defined by the agreements. These payments are required to continue through each employee's stated vested date. Upon retirement and participant request, the fair values of the salary continuation accounts are to be paid to the employees in sixty substantially equal monthly installments. At June 30, 2024 and 2023, the investments – deferred compensation consist primarily of common stocks and are presented at fair value based on Level 1 measurements. A liability is accrued for the obligation under these plans and is included in the statements of financial position. The expense incurred for the deferred compensation plans was \$79,765 in fiscal year 2024 and \$70,055 in fiscal year 2023, resulting in a deferred compensation liability of \$1,328,400 and \$1,134,420 as of June 30, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

#### Note 15: RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Commission has an agreement with an insurance carrier whereby the Commission's group health insurance are partially self-insured. Under the agreement, the Commission funds each employee and/or his/her dependent claims up to a maximum of \$50,000 annually. The maximum liability to the claim fund cannot exceed \$1,000,000 annually.

At June 30, 2024, the Commission had no unfunded liability for submitted claims. Claims for occurrences prior to June 30, 2024, were unknown at that date and are estimated to be insignificant.

As discussed in Note 13, the Commission also maintains a plan that provides certain health care insurance benefits for retired employees and their dependents. The Commission has certain employees and former employees that participate in this plan. SACS accounts for these benefits under FASB ASC 715, which requires an entity that sponsors a postretirement benefit plan to recognize in its statement of financial position, the funded status of the benefit plan. Accordingly, the entire funded status at June 30, 2024, has been recorded by SACS.

The Commission's portion of the obligation in the amount of \$923,705 has been recognized as due to related party - postretirement benefit obligation in the accompanying statements of financial position.

During the year ended June 30, 2024, the Commission charged CTECS \$52,500 for the use of business administration personnel and office space. At June 30, 2024, the Commission had a receivable of \$18,007 due from CTECS for various operating expenses paid by the Commission on behalf of CTECS.
