One of the most significant actions taken by the Board was the approval of substantial changes to our Substantive Change policy and procedures. These revisions are grounded in clarity, alignment, and trust to ensure our oversight remains rigorous while removing unnecessary barriers for institutions.



Looking Ahead:

Our 100-Day Plan continues to guide our efforts to strengthen service, communication, and cross-team alignment. Work is well underway across multiple initiatives, including the early stages of revising the Principles of Accreditation, a major undertaking that will shape the future of our work and the institutions we serve.

PRUITT'S LAW OR LORE:

January Preview and What's Next

Dr. Stephen Pruitt's **Law or Lore** weekly blog series continues to address some of the most persistent misunderstandings in accreditation.

In January, the blog series featured installments on Credit for Prior Learning, Hold Harmless for the QEP, and the question "Does SACSCOC Accreditation Stifle Creativity and Innovation?"

In the coming weeks, topics will include Institutional Governance, Using Course Grades as Assessment Evidence, and Using Grades as Meaningful Assessment Evidence.

The SACSCOC Board of Trustees Approved these Major Changes at its Dec. 2025 Meeting:

- **51% of substantive change categories were removed**, reducing complexity and helping institutions more easily determine what is required.
- **7 categories** were reassigned for presidential approval, reducing turnaround time to as little as **one week** after final materials are received.
- First **three-year baccalaureate** degree program approved at the **University of Lynchburg**, and further guidance is coming.
- The **Emergency Temporary Relocation of Instruction** policy has been **discontinued**.
